RALPH SCORE

The Storyteller

Young Shakespeare

Ralph Score wanted to tell stories, he just might not have realized at first. "I saw a stop motion animation with construction paper; black and white. I saw that and I had to try something like that. That was at eight. That's what got me interested."

So, like many greats, he started in play, staging elaborate plays and productions all in his front yard. He weaved great epics and dramas, with everything he

could get his hands on. "Yeah, these weren't little, they were like Sampson with these big columns made out of cardboard boxes, full costume and everything."

Ralph kept this creativity and brought it with him into high school, resulting in his being invited to a senior film project his junior year. Excited by this and hungry for more he enrolled in Jerry Carrie's film class his next year. "I bought my first camera and editor and everything with my first project being a stop motion film on how to make a chicken sandwich."

Labor of Love

Filming anything can take time. He could spend from one hour to days shooting something. That's only half the process though, in

some cases maybe only a quarter. Editing a piece of work takes time, a lot of time, and no one knows that better than Ralph Score. "Right now I'm editing a B.B. King video and just setting it up to work on took eight hours. Then it took me three hours to do the first three lines."

This isn't without reason, though. When Ralph edits something he makes sure he likes it. When he likes it, so will everyone else. "I really cut my teeth at the video editing place I used to work at because the building had no insurance, so somebody had to be there round clock and there were only three of us. On the nights I would stay overnight, I had access to an editing facility and I would just take a pop song I liked and make a music video

of it storyboarding these old commercials. I'd then shoot myself and cut the video just to get a sense of storytelling, cause that's all it really is: storytelling.”

So, unsurprisingly, a few jobs later, Ralph got an interesting proposition from a friend.

"We wanted to make a movie, like a real blockbuster, but we were told we needed to make a movie first to show what we could do, so that's where

Planet of the Killer Robots came in."

Being passionate about a project can make all the difference but that doesn't make it easy. "We'd get so excited when pitching it. 'This happens and after that this happens!' When you're



passionate it's all you will talk about, but when making a movie, you need two things: real actors and food. You're usually in a field for ten hours when you planned for six, so people need to eat. You also gotta handle payment and budget etcetera. Yeah, movies aren't easy," Ralph ended with a chuckle.

Jack of All Trades, Master of One

From the start, Ralph has been involved in all sides of production: behind the camera, in front of the camera, directing, editing, lighting, sound, and a hundred other jobs that are involved in everything he's done. "On our movie, *Planet of The Killer Robots*, I was the co-producer, director of photography, camera operator,

organized the score, did the 3D effects, and edited it."

So, having done it all, what does he enjoy the most? "It's gotta be behind the camera. I love photography and if I could just shoot all day I'd be happy."

Despite hearing what his favorite medium was, I wouldn't call Ralph a photographer, and even after the interview, I struggled to put him under a single title that could categorize everything he's done, until I listened to the interview again. Ralph had been telling me what he was the whole interview without me realizing. He's a storyteller. From lighting a live performance to filming how to make a sandwich, Ralph has consistently been telling stories

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
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
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for years. He even teaches a class on it here at WTA from time to time. When ending Ralph had two things to say, "First, when editing, it's all about file management. It can make or break a project and will make your life so much easier. It will help you stay in that creative flow without having to look for a specific scene buried in hours of unnamed footage. [Second] when looking to boost creativity, write, rewrite, and rewrite some more. Eventually, you'll find the story you want to tell."


Periaktoi

Theater has come a long way since its start and has changed considerably, but we nod to Greek culture for its point of origin. The same is true for periaktoi.

Pictured above and to the left as three-faced triangular prisms, periaktoi were theatrical devices designed for quick and seamless scene changes. Above is an example of what a Greek theater is thought to have used. The periaktoi are stationary and simple in practice. The left depicts Renaissance technique, incorporating periaktoi into a set that gives the illusion of depth to the scene and allows actors to perform within the periaktoi rather than in front of them.



Periaktoi retain their relevance and are still used in theater today. Willcox Theater and Arts' own Creative Youth Productions used variations of periaktoi in their most recent performance, *Ho Ho Ho! The Santa Claus Chronicles* (written by Pat Cook, and produced by special arrangement with Pioneer Drama Service, Denver, Colorado). That particular set incorporated two periaktoi. Both incorporated flaps on each of its three faces that could be extended to accommodate larger scenery.

Each image displayed on this page highlights the set production of both periaktoi. The physical woodworking and crafting for the periaktoi was contributed by a long-time volunteer and they were painted by the participants of Creative Youth Productions with the help of their mentors, Amanda Berger, Isaac Garay, and Genevieve Landman.



Once finished, they were put to use during the showings of *Ho Ho Ho! The Santa Claus Chronicles* in The Palace of Art and Theater. Pictured below are members of Creative Youth Productions during live performances and three scene changes achieved with their periakttoi!


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

